

KOREA QUIET AGAIN; RIOT TOLL PUT AT 89

**Eighty-two Chinese Reported
Slain and 107 Badly Hurt—
Police Fire Killed 7 Koreans.**

COMPENSATION TO BE MADE

**Japan to Aid Victims and Families
—Nanking Demands Prompt Action
for Protection of Its Nationals.**

TOKYO, July 7.—Comparative calm prevailed today following sanguinary outbreaks yesterday in Korea. Police have been reinforced at various danger points and the authorities are confident they can prevent any extensive recrudescence of the trouble.

Early this morning Korean mobs fired on empty Chinese houses at Hei-jo but were quickly dispersed. Minor rioting was reported in some villages around Hei-jo. Chinese shops remained closed in most parts of Korea.

Shujiro Hara, Minister of Overseas Affairs, informed the Cabinet today that the outlook was improving. Fifty soldiers are reinforcing the Hei-jo police force. Thirty were sent to Chinnam-po at the request of the civil authorities. Otherwise troops are not being used.

Hei-jo Heavily Guarded.

Hei-jo is now patrolled by 350 armed police and fifty soldiers. Rumors of Chinese counter-attacks have so alarmed some Koreans that they are packing up and leaving the town.

Today 1,000 Chinese refugees from Seoui and Chemulplo sailed for Tsing-tao.

Late reports from Hei-jo state that eighty-two Chinese were killed and 107 seriously injured yesterday. Three thousand Chinese are being sheltered in public buildings and factories. Seven Koreans were killed by police fire yesterday afternoon in

an attack on a Chinese factory where Chinese had taken refuge.

The Japanese Cabinet considered the situation today and voted to compensate the Chinese victims, but decided that the situation did not call for exceptional measures.

Nanking Demands Action.

SHANGHAI, July 7.—The Nanking Government has announced that strong representations have been made to the Japanese Government regarding anti-Chinese riots in Korea, which, according to local reports, show no sign of diminishing. Nanking has officially demanded that Japan take immediate steps to stop the riots, the Nanking Government reserving the right to claim compensation, and that Japan guarantee the safety of Chinese Nationals in Korea.

Local newspapers are full of protests of various organizations, which claim distortion of the facts of the original incident at Wanpaoshan, Manchuria, and tax the Japanese military policy in Manchuria with the responsibility.

The Nanking Government is urged to adopt a firm attitude, the National Association of Chambers of Commerce declaring there are 100,000 Chinese merchants in Korea whose lives and property are imperiled.

Korean newspapers are assailed for alleged distortion of the facts, thereby instigating Koreans to attack Chinese.
